Join us for the *Light Bulb Moment* Pre-Conference, sponsored by the STEM Interest Group, to learn how to assist entrepreneurs to take their idea to the next level. The session will delve into the four types of intellectual property, give in-depth information about trademarks, and give state and local resources available for libraries, small businesses, and entrepreneurs.

Her areas of specialty are engineering and computer science (particularly for the undergraduate audience), and intellectual property. Meredith followed up her Africa experience with a job at Ole Miss where she worked for three years as the Accounting and Electronic Resources librarian. Meredith joined Clemson University

Libraries in August 2003 as one of the Business Librarians. She works with students and faculty in the areas of Accounting, Management, Marketing, and the MBA program.

Addressing Dysfunction and Incorporating Self-Care for Library Staff

Concepts from the authors' book, *The Dysfunctional Library*, will be the focus for the irst half of the interactive session. Topics include workplace incivility, toxic behaviors, conlict,` and weak leadership. The team will also introduce a variety of solutions to shape a positive and productive library work environment. The second half of the session will focus on concepts from the authors' book, *The Mindful Librarian*. Participants will be introduced to the basic principles of mindfulness and discover the multitude of ways that mindful practice can improve the specific work librarians do, from reference services to workplace relationships to goal-setting and much more. Ideas for dealing with stress and burnout will be discussed and participants will receive multiple suggestions and resources to gain deeper knowledge on the topic in the future.



Richard Moniz, MA (History), MLIS, EdD served as the Director of Library Services for Johnson & Wales University's North Miami campus from 1997 - 2004 and has been the Director of Library Services at Johnson & Wales University's Charlotte campus since 2004. He has also been an instructor for the University of North Carolina at Greensboro's LIS program since 2007. He is sole author of the textbook *Practical and Effective Management of Libraries* (2010), co-author of *Fundamentals for the Academic Liaison* (2014), co-author and co-editor of *The Personal Librarian: Enhancing the Student Experience* (2014), co-author of *The Mindful*

Librarian (2016), co-author of Librarians and Instructional Designers: Innovation and Collaboration (2016), co-author of *The Dysfunctional Library: Challenges and Solutions to Workplace Relationships* (2017), and coeditor of the forthcoming ALA book entitled *Recipes for Mindfulness in Your Library*. He also has a

contributed chapter in *Mid-Career Library & Information Professionals: A Leadership Primer* (2011) and in *Advances in Library Administration and Organization* (2015 edition). He is actively engaged in the profession through facilitating and co-facilitating workshops, talks, and keynote addresses associated with various topics surrounding librarianship. He has held a number of committee and board responsibilities within ALA LLAMA, ACRL CLS, and Metrolina Library Association and is always interested in learning from others in the field.



Jo Henry, MLIS, MPA, serves as Librarian with the Charlotte Mecklenburg Library. Previously, she was the Information Services Librarian at South Piedmont Community College. She is coauthor of *The Dysfunctional Library: Challenges and Solutions to Workplace Relationships, The Mindful Librarian: Connecting the Practice of Mindfulness to Librarianship* (2016), *Fundamentals for the Academic Liaison* (2014), and *The Personal Librarian: Enhancing the Student Experience* (2014). She has published in *Journal of Library Administration*, *Public Services Quarterly*, *Library Review*, *Community and Junior College*

Libraries, and College and *Research Library News*. In addition to co-facilitating workshops, she has presented at the ALA Annual Conference, North Carolina Library Association Conference, and the Metrolina Library Association Conference.



Joe Eshleman received his Master of Library and Information Science degree from the University of North Carolina at Greensboro in 2007. He was the Instruction Librarian at Johnson & Wales University Library–Charlotte from 2008-2015. Currently, he is a librarian at Central Piedmont Community College. He is a co-author of *Fundamentals* for the Academic Liaison and a contributor to The Personal Librarian: Enhancing the Student Experience as well as a coauthor of Librarians and Instructional Designers:

Collaboration and Innovation, The Mindful Librarian: Connecting the Practice of Mindfulness to Librarianship and The Dysfunctional Library: Challenges and Solutions to Workplace Relationships. He has presented on numerous occasions, including at the American Library Association Conference, the Lilly Conference on College and University Teaching, the Teaching Professor Technology Conference, and the First National Personal Librarian and First Year Experience Library Conference.

R. David Lankes is a professor and the director of the University of South Carolina's School of Library and Information Science. Lankes has always been interested in combining theory and practice to create active research projects that make a difference. His work has been funded by organizations such as The MacArthur Foundation, The Institute for Library and Museum Services, NASA, The U.S.

Department of Education, The U.S. Department of Defense, The National Science Foundation, The U.S. State Department, and The American Library Association.

Lankes is a passionate advocate for libraries and their essential role in today's society earning him the American Library Association's Ken Haycock Award for Promoting Librarianship in 2016. He also seeks to understand how information approaches and technologies can be used to transform industries. In this capacity he has served on advisory boards and study teams in the fields of libraries, telecommunications, education, and transportation including at the National Academies. He has been a visiting fellow at the National Library of Canada, The Harvard School of Education, and was the first fellow of ALA's Office for Information Technology Policy. His book, *The Atlas of New Librarianship* won the 2012 ABC-CLIO/Greenwood Award for the Best Book in Library Literature.

Richard E. Ashby Jr. obtained his Bachelor's degree from New York Institute of Technology and his MLIS degree from Queens College in New York. Mr. Ashby began as a security guard in the Wyandanch Public Library. Over time he rose through the ranks as a library custodian, page, lead page, page supervisor, children's program coordinator, teen services and head of circulation. While working in the library Mr. Ashby went to graduate school full time. Mr. Ashby believes that serving the community through local and international partnerships is the future of libraries. While at the Wyandanch Public Library, he collaborated with the community by creating innovative programs that engaged the

community both young and senior, by developing a teen advisory board, and by donating books to several West African countries. Mr. Ashby gave his energy to the New York Black Librarian's Caucus, where he later became the Vice President and President. He kept attending meetings in New York even after moving to Philadelphia and accepting a position as the Director of the Yeadon Public Library. Since he has been in Philadelphia, he secured the future of the New York Black Librarian's Caucus. Mr. Ashby negotiated with the New York Library Association to become one of its affiliates; this affiliate program expands the reach of the NYBLC. As a resident of Philadelphia, Mr. Ashby started an afterschool program to help the neighborhood youth called LiteracyNation. He became the only person registered a solo "Side Walk Librarian" Under Mr. Ashby's leadership he later formed his afterschool program into LiteracyNation Inc., a non-profit organization, servicing people through community outreach and by giving away hundreds of new and gently used books. During Mr. Ashby's last five years as the Yeadon Public Library director, he developed Café 3, which is the flagship program of his library. This program distributes approximately 250 lunches a week to children at his library, supplied by the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. Mr. Ashby partnered with Goodwill to employ seniors who bring to his library a wealth of experience to his team. Mr. Ashby sponsors local artists and authors. He also initiated a Cops and Croissants program to help the Yeadon Police force and the community get to know one another. His colleagues for these and many more efforts have recognized Mr. Ashby. He is an accomplished presenter and motivational speaker. In 2014, his colleagues with the Librarian of the Year award recognized him presented by the Black Caucus of the American Library Association, in 2016, he received the Movers and Shakers Award presented by the Library Journal. Mr. Ashby serves his community spiritually, as the Co-Pastor of Church of Christian Fellowship. In June of 2018, Mr. Ashby accepted the leadership of the Black Caucus of the American Librarian Association, after having served as its Vice President for two years. One of Mr. Ashby's favorite sayings is "Our programming is diverse [enough] to meet all of the changes public libraries are undergoing." "With literacy and justice for all."
