Auditing 101: How To Effectively Audit Your Collection

Ashley Silvera & Savannah Green, Richland Library

This session will introduce attendees to the significance of diversity and inclusion in literature and, effectively, in library collections. Through this presentation, they will gain a better understanding of the importance of representation, learn to evaluate literary works for diversity, and become more familiarized with the way in which Richland Library has been conducting their collection audit over the past four years. The session will contain several components including:

- Defining diversity and inclusion in the context of literature
- The shifts and changes in publishing and social media that reflected the focus on the increased diversity and inclusion in literature.
- The history of Richland Library's collection audit (i.e. when did it start, the training, examples of the documents that we utilize to complete the audit, what types of audits are we currently completing, etc.)
- How has the audit shifted our work? How are we applying it to our selection process and how has it changed our best practices?

It is our hope that this session will provide attendees with the skills and tools to feel more confident completing their very own collection audit. While this isn't a comprehensive course on how to complete an audit, attendees can better understand that inclusion in literature goes beyond representation and involves creating an environment within literary works where individuals from all backgrounds feel valued, acknowledged, and empowered. A key component to inclusion in literature is the creation of a space where diverse voices (authors and creators) are safe, empowered, and celebrated when they contribute their own stories and ideas to the literary world. Diverse representation in library collections is crucial for all audiences, not just children, as it offers many benefits that enrich the reading experience, promote empathy, and reflect the reality of our diverse world. Although we are conducting our audit from the perspective of public librarians, we believe that this session will be impactful for anyone who is attending the conference. It is not only a tool that can be utilized with a larger collection, but also something as small as a storytime collection.

Meet DAYLO: On-Campus Book Club, Off-Campus Pro-Literacy Youth Advocates

DAYLO: Diversity Awareness Youth Literacy Organization

Mentors and student members of DAYLO: the Diversity Awareness Youth Literacy Organization will present an educational session on effective pro-literacy student advocacy as it relates to book bans and education censorship, discussing topics like the value of a foundational diversity-themed book club, the importance of self care for student advocates, and strategies for a range of community literacy service projects and collaborations. This session is ideal for high school and middle school librarians, educators, and administrators. Founded at Beaufort High School in 2021, DAYLO now has nine chapters in schools across South Carolina. DAYLO's student-led pro-literacy efforts have been profiled nationally on Nick News and in the feature-length documentary film Banned Together, as well as in Education Week, Book Riot, Publishers Weekly, and School Library Journal, and regionally as front-page news stories in the Charleston Post and Courier and the Beaufort Island News. DAYLO students have spoken at the annual conferences of the American Library Association, South Carolina Association of School Librarians, South Carolina Council of the Teachers of English, and Palmetto State Literacy Association, as well as in virtual events hosted by the American Library Association, the Children's Book Council, the Right to Read Network of the National Coalition Against Censorship, and EveryLibrary's Library Advocacy and Funding Conference. Early this year, DAYLO was also awarded a national commendation from the American Association of School Librarians and the Richard W. Riley Award for Human and Civil Rights from the South Carolina Education Association. DAYLO has also developed the youth advocacy toolkit for the national resource websites Get Ready, Stay Ready and READCON.
